

Vacancy Update

It is 4 months now since Tony retired and parishioners throughout the benefice may well be wondering what is going on the enable the appointment of a new rector.

First off, the benefice has to produce a 'profile'. This is a document that describes what the church in each parish is like, what activities related to the church take place plus a general description of the village where the church is and local facilities etc. to give a potential incumbent sufficient information for them to decide whether or not they might be interested.

From this document, the diocese produces an advertisement that is placed in the Church Times and also on line. Thereafter we are dependent on the interest that the advert generates and, bearing in mind that there are more vacancies than priests to fill them, the more attractive a post appears the greater the likelihood of attracting a new incumbent.

All 7 parishes completed their part of the process by the end of October and the information was duly sent off. There has been no advert as yet and no progress has been made by the diocese towards that as we found out recently when an enquiry was made. It seems that the information we sent was not as they wanted it but no need was seen to communicate that to us until we enquired! At least 8 wasted weeks! The way forward is for us to modify our submission to suit their requirements as clearly nothing is going to happen until we do. We shall do this very early in the new year. Regrettably we should all be prepared for a lengthy vacancy.

The rectory is currently empty though some effort has been made to brighten up the interior with a partial redecoration and new floor coverings. The diocese's intention is to let it and there are signs that someone is about to move in.












FRICASSÈE OF TURKEY

Just in case you still have some turkey uneaten from Christmas or another occasion, here's an idea to use it up.

Melt the butter and add the flour and stir over a gentle heat until smooth.

Gradually add the chicken stock and stir until it has boiled for five minutes.

Beat the yolk of the egg and stir in the lemon juice and cream, then add these to the sauce which you have made.

Pour over the chicken – can be put into the oven at any time to heat up. Serve onto cooked rice, or with mashed potato

Precooked leftover turkey.
1oz. Butter
1oz. Plain flour
Yolk of one egg
1 dessert spoon of lemon juice
2tbs. Single cream
½ pint Chicken stock

In fact the first English Bible was not available until 1538 so the only understanding of the Bible that people had would be what the Vicar explained to them and the illustrations on the walls.

I do not know what pictures were painted on the walls but I imagine it looked beautiful. Although I believe that some churches had scary hell and damnation type pictures on the walls, to keep the members of the congregation in order!

Why the plaster was chipped off to reveal the original sandstone I don't know. It maybe because it was a big job and very expensive to repaint it every few years to keep it in good condition?

Christmas Carol Service




